It is great to welcome everyone back. Attendance last week was 94.1%. While we are above the current national average, we are still aiming for our school target of 96%. Well done to Year 7, who currently have the highest attendance as a year group with 95.6%.

Assemblies for last week and this week have focused on Remembrance. We will come together on Friday for two minutes of silence as a show of respect and for us all to reflect on what Armistice Day means to us individually, and collectively.

Our last survey returned 105 responses, which equates to 13% of our families. We make decisions based on the outcomes of these surveys and would really welcome your feedback.

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School News

Attendance

At Moorside High School, we recognise that attendance and punctuality are vital components to the success of our students. Good attendance raises achievement; it helps to establish good patterns of behaviour and provides a routine in preparation for life beyond school. Our standard for good attendance is 96% which enables your child to reach their full potential. This means your child needs to attend school for at least 183 out of 190 days.

- School starts at 8.45am. Please ensure your child is in school complete with their equipment so they are ready to learn
- Please send medical evidence to school or email to jkinder@moorside.staffs.sch.uk to cover any appointments
- If you have not already done so, please download the Arbor App to track your child's attendance, behaviour, and progress. Please see previous bulletins for our Arbor Top Tips.
- All correspondence is communicated via emails, so please check your inbox frequently
- Request for leave during the school term will not be authorised. Leave will only be granted in exceptional circumstances.
- If your child tests positive for Covid-19, then please treat this as a normal illness pupils no longer need to isolate.

An attendance figure of 90% is the equivalent of 4-weeks lost learning, 80% is equivalent to 8-weeks and 70% is equivalent to 11.5-weeks.

Being late to school adds up to lost learning. Arriving 30-minutes late every day is the same as being absent for 19 days of the school year. Pupils who arrive after the registers have closed at 8.50am will be given an L (late) code. If pupils arrive after 9.25am then they will be given a U (unauthorised absence) code.

Unfortunately, pupils will receive a lunchtime detention if they do not have a valid reason for being late.


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Book Corner
