Attendance

At Moorside High School, we recognise that attendance and punctuality are vital components to the success of our students. Good attendance raises achievement; it helps to establish good patterns of behaviour and provides a routine in preparation for life beyond school. Our standard for good attendance is 96% which enables your child to reach their full potential. This means your child needs to attend school for at least 183 out of 190 days. School starts at 8.45 am. Please ensure your child is in school complete with their equipment so they are ready to learn.

Please send medical evidence to school or email it to jkinder@moorside.staffs.sch.uk to cover any appointments. A 90% attendance is the equivalent of four weeks lost learning, 80% is equivalent to eight weeks and 70% is equivalent to almost twelve weeks.

Being late to school adds up to lost learning too. Arriving 30-minutes late every day is the same as being absent for 19 days of the school year.
