Challenge Day

The Year 11 Challenge Day started with a reminder of the importance of Online Safety. Session 2 was on employability. Session 3 followed on from this and covered money management, and in the final two sessions of the day pupils worked their way through multiple challenges and finished the day with a fashion show where they paraded the all-weather festival ponchos they had created.

Belgium Trip

Thank you to Georgie E, who has produced an excellent write up of the recent Belgium trip, which we will share with you below:

The Belgium trip was honestly so much fun. Having the opportunity to visit a new country, spend a few days alone with my friends while appreciating our history as a country was such an experience. The outward journey took place overnight on the 14th of February and it is important to make sure you get some sleep or you will be very tired on the first day, as once we arrived in Belgium in the morning we went straight out to start our activities.

The hotel we stayed at was very nice. The catering was better than I imagined. I always found something to eat while I was there. They served croissants, cereals, toast, and things like that for breakfast as well as having a range of spreads for the bread items. Then at teatime there was always chips and pizza for anyone who did not like any of the options; they had salad and vegetables for a healthy section and served desserts too. I was pleasantly surprised by the rooms too. I was in a group of three and in our room was one double bed and two single beds, all of which were very comfortable to sleep in. We had air conditioning, a TV, a seating area, a desk, and a wardrobe in the room as well. Plus, we had our own bathroom with the essentials: a bath, shower, toilet, bin, sink and a huge mirror. All the lights and water worked fine as well.







DAY 1: On the first day, we went straight from travelling into activities. We started off at around 10:05 visiting one of our British cemeteries at Lijssenthoek which had a small museum about the Casualty Clearing Station that existed during the war which had helped injured soldiers. We then visited another British cemetery at 11:30 at Essex Farm, the site of an Advanced Dressing Station for causalities during the war and the site of the burial of the youngest British solider, Valentine Strudwick who was just 15 when he died.

The British cemeteries which are looked after by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission are very well kept, peaceful places and in terms of looks, the graves are white and uniform. It was quite daunting seeing all those graves in a moderately small space. My friends and I noticed the different symbols amongst the graves representing different places the soldiers were from. Within about 10-15 rows of 30, that is 300-450 graves in total, there were 21 soldiers from Staffordshire. That is a scary statistic.


After visiting the cemeteries, we got some free time to look around and find food in the town of Ypres. The area we were in was tourist friendly and they spoke English, which was useful. The other two activities were visiting a museum called 'In Flanders Field' which covers everything from why the war started to what happened at the end and getting to go to the chocolate shop there was a little show in the chocolate shop, and it was a lot of fun to watch!

DAY 2: On the second day, we visited a third British Cemetery called Tyne Cot, this is the largest CWGC cemetery in the world. We then visited our first German cemetery at Langemark; they were nothing alike. The German cemetery had such an unsettling feeling to it, and it was just so much different to the British cemeteries. There were numerous German soldiers buried in one grave - there were 17 in just one grave. Plus, there were some graves that did not identify the soldier, most likely due to injuries in the war which was disturbing. We counted 5,800 soldiers in just one partthere were over 44,000 in total, and it was only a small cemetery.



We also visited a place called Sanctuary Wood which has a small museum but also original trenches from the first World War which we could explore. I can imagine that the conditions were terrible for the soldiers fighting there.

On the evening of the second day, we went back into Ypres to take part in the Last Post Ceremony which has taken place there every evening since 1928 (except during the German occupation of Belgium during WWII) in memory of those British and Commonwealth soldiers who died in WWI. We laid a wreath of remembrance on behalf of all the Moorside Community.




