





























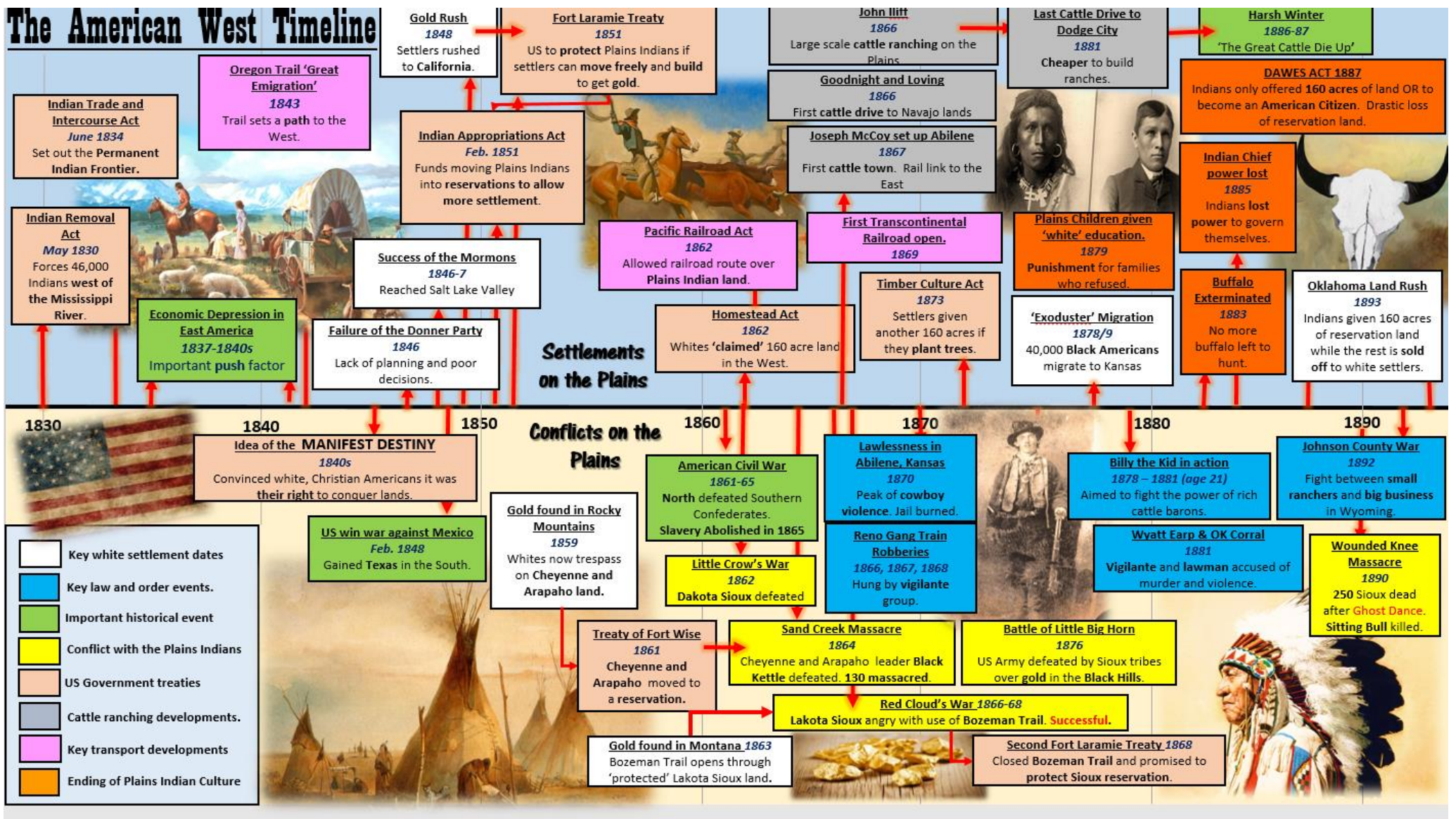

HOW TO ANSWER QUESTIONS

How do I answer questions about The American West?

1. CONSEQUENCE [8]
Explain **two** consequences of....
In this answer you are explaining the result of something and the difference it made.

Two paragraphs – one for each consequence.
You must say what the consequence was and then EXPLAIN the impact and difference it made.

POINT. One consequence was...

2. NARRATIVE ACCOUNT [8]
Write a **narrative account** analysing...
KEY SKILLS:

- Explain how one event led to another.
- Do this in a logical chronological order.
- Always remember to add a point of your own.
- Always link back to the question.
- Refer back to the question at the end.
- Use specific knowledge (see separate box)

There is no set structure for this – just make sure your answer is sequenced.

- Point 1 given in the question.
- For example/instance.... (what was it? What happened? Provide facts/evidence)
- Explain how this led to the next stage and link back to the question.

- Point 2 given in the question.
- For example/instance.... (what was it? What happened? Provide facts/evidence)
- Explain how this led to the next stage and link back to the question.

What about my own point? This can be included at any stage of your answer.

What should I use as EVIDENCE?

- S – Statistics
- P – People
- E – Events
- L – Laws
- D – Dates
- F – Facts
- T – Key Terms
