

### **Provider Access Policy**

#### Introduction

This policy statement sets out the school's arrangements for managing the access of providers to pupils at the school for the purposes of giving them information about the provider's education or training offer. This complies with the school's legal obligations under Section 42B of the Education Act 1997 and the updated Provider Access Legislation (PAL) enacted in January 2023.

#### Student entitlement

Students in years 7 - 11 are entitled:

- To find out about technical education qualifications and apprenticeships opportunities, as part of a careers programme which provides information on the full range of education and training options available at each transition point.
- To hear from a range of local providers about the opportunities they offer, including technical education and apprenticeships – through options evenings, assemblies and group discussions and taster events.
- To understand how to make applications for the full range of academic and technical courses.

The updated PAL specifies schools must provide at least four encounters with approved providers of apprenticeships and technical education for all their students:

- Two encounters for pupils during the 'first key phase' (year 8 or 9) that are mandatory for all pupils to attend
- Two encounters for pupils during the 'second key phase' (year 10 or 11) that are mandatory for all pupils to attend

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This new legislation will become a key mechanism to further help learners understand and takeup, not just apprenticeships, but wider technical education options such as T-Levels and Higher Technical Qualifications.

### Management of provider access requests

### **Opportunities for access**

All students, parents and families have access to a Level 6 qualified Careers Advisor. The adviser attends Parents Evenings, GCSE Choices Evening and is available for individuals and families to book appointments. Please contact Lee Gordon using the details above.

Students may contact Mr Gordon via lunch time/break time drop ins, by email and through form tutors.

Providers are welcome to leave a copy of their prospectus or other relevant course literature in the Careers Office, which is managed by the named contact. The Careers Office is available to all students at lunch times as well as during careers appointments etc.

Careers information, prospectuses etc can be handed out during a.m. registrations through L Gordon visiting form groups OR at the end of an assembly/provider talk.

All students participate in a Personal Development Day focussed on careers education which covers the topics listed below. Other events and visits take place during the academic year.

The activities listed above, Parents Evenings and assemblies (8.50 a.m. until 9.10 a.m daily) offer providers an opportunity to come into school to speak to students and/or their parents. The school calendar varies from year to year, so providers need to contact the staff member named above to identify the most suitable opportunity. These events are usually calendared well in advance, so it is essential that providers contact us early in the academic year to be involved in our planning.

Access to students will be granted on the understanding that the information and guidance offered by providers is related to technical courses and apprenticeship opportunities only.
